Points to Remember for APA 7 Citation

- 1. When citing books, articles, or webpages, capitalize the first letter of title and subtitle only, and any proper nouns.
- 2. Do not put a period after the URL in a reference entry.
- 3. A **reference list** must be included at the end of your paper on its own page. The title References is to be centered on the page (do not underline the heading or use quotation marks). **The reference list should be in alphabetical order and double-spaced**. Begin all entries at the left margin with extra lines indented ½ inch. This is called a **hanging indentation**.
- 4. Use **Times New Roman** 12-point font with normal 1-inch margins.
- 5. **In-text citations** are required in the body of your paper when you use direct quotes or when you paraphrase something from a source. The citation information is placed in brackets directly after the quote or paraphrase.

Examples of In-Text	APA – (author, date)	
Citation	*(and paper number with a direct quote)	
Direct quote	"Time in nature helps both the child and the parent by building their shared sense of attachment and by reducing stress" (Louv, 2012, p.145).	
	*Include the author's last name, date of publication, and page number in the intext citation with commas in between for a direct quote.	
Paraphrasing	Spending time in nature can help people build their physical, emotional and family fitness (Louv, 2012).	
	*no page number required for paraphrasing	

Two notable changes in the APA 7th edition:

- 1. Do not include the location of the publisher; only identify the publisher.
- 2. Do not include the words "Retrieved from" before URLs in a website citation (in most cases).
